A laughing matter "In 1985, I talked to the Snowshoe president about opening a comedy club at the resort. He gave me three weeks to show a profit. So every day I was down at the liftlines with a bullhorn, talking up the club. I had laryngitis the whole season. But the club worked, and we sell it out five nights a week with regionally and nationally known comics—people who have been on Letterman and Leno."

What's up, Doc? "About nine years ago, I figured the resort needed a mascot, so I went to a costume shop and bought some bunny outfits. Besides, I wasn't doing anything else during the day."

Bunny patrol "The comment I hear most often from skiers is, 'I wish I had my gun—it's hunting season!' Then they usually say, 'Yee haw!'"

Pink haze "Several times I've helped out injured skiers. They look up at me—a 6-foot-3 pink bunny towering over them—and I always say, 'It's OK, I'm *supposed* to be here."

Rain on his parade "I don't like to ski when it's snowing or raining because my fur mats."

Advice to aspiring skiers "Take a lesson. Don't let your significant other teach you to ski."

Advice to aspiring comics "Get out of the business."
